Trapping Season Dates:

Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks has a long history of scientific management that has resulted in prolific wildlife populations. But scientific management is under attack by those who claim to be defending it. Unfortunately, we are once again watching a weaponized judicial system prevent the scientific management of our wildlife. In Northwest Montana, the biggest threat to wildlife is not hunting, trapping or logging, it is the Courts.

Radical environmental groups and the courts have pushed a preservationist agenda on all of us, and as a result our wildlife is suffering. Northwest Montana, when actively managed, was a wildlife oasis. Now after 25-30 years of "do nothing" management, forced by the courts, we are experiencing the lowest ungulate populations in the last 100 years, specifically in the Bob Marshall and surrounding districts.

There is a counterintuitive fact, that regulated harvest of carnivores is critical to their long-term sustainability. From 2008 through 2023 the Average elk calf recruitment in the Bob Marshall EMU (HD's 140 & 150) has dropped to a staggering 13.8 calves per 100 cows (it takes a recruitment of 25 to have a stable population). If nothing is done to improve elk numbers and recruitment the long-term outlook of these large carnivores is just as bleak as it is for the ungulates. Contrary to popular belief, wolves, bears and lions are all dependent on abundant prey availability. If you cannot maintain sustainable recruitment of your ungulate populations, you will see corresponding reductions in your dependent carnivore populations.

It is a true statement that there are more elk in Montana today than there were 20 years ago (which is often cited by these groups), but that statement is not true if you look at the core occupied areas for wolves, bears and lions. Ungulate populations in these areas significantly below their long term populations and could benefit significantly from science-based predator management. If FWP and the Commission is allowed to do their job we will have science based wildlife management, but unfortunately their ability to scientifically manage has been taken away by a number of ignorant judges.

I wish we had more flexibility with our trapping dates, because the reduced season length will result in a continuation of downward ungulate population trends in a number of our hunting districts. But I know we don't have any flexibility, we are stuck with this ruling for now.

My request of the Department and Commission is to continue to stay committed to science-based wildlife management in spite of the attacks that are coming against you. Continue to invest in science because if we have the actual data on what is taking place with our wildlife populations management decisions will become obvious.

Commissioner Burrows Amendment:

I cannot speak specifically about setbacks in Region 2, but I know that our current setback structure in Region 1 needs to be revisited and I would encourage a similar proposal in Region 1. Along the South Fork of the Flathead, specifically around Spotted Bear, we are experiencing low calf recruitment and yet the current trap setback limits trapper's ability to effectively trap. In the winter spotted bear experiences little to know recreational traffic and would benefit significantly from the removal of trap setbacks similar to what is being proposed by Commissioner Burrows. This should be thought out and not implemented in areas of potential conflict, but trap setbacks should be removed. What's worse is FWP in conjunction with the USFS has established road closures to over snow vehicles in areas that were once known to be big game winter range. What has occurred is these big game winter ranges see no trapping and our best winter habitat has turned into areas where wolf and mountain lion predation are now unmitigated. When these road closures were established, wolves were not present on the landscape. At one time the closures were a good thing but now are having the exact opposite effect of what was intended.

In summary, so long as minimizing conflict is considered first, trap setbacks should be reduced wherever possible.

Dear Madame Chair and Fish and Wildlife Commissioners,

RE: Amendment Regarding Region 2, Ravalli County Setbacks

Commissioner Burrows' amendment would end trap setbacks required for furbearers and wolves on all Ravalli County roads closed to motor vehicle and OHV use during the designated trapping season, with four exceptions.

Fish, Wildlife and Parks' response foretells real consequences: "The amendment reduces the number of routes with setbacks and has real potential to increase non-target captures of domestic dogs and reduce support for recreational trapping."

This amendment amounts to an effective taking of public lands and puts the public in danger. The Commission's first responsibility is public safety. The population growth in Ravalli and Missoula Counties has exploded in the past ten years. Many more people are recreating on public lands, compounding the risk of injury or worse. Hikers, bikers, horseback riders and skiers with kids and dogs use these roads through the winter because they don't have vehicular traffic. They expect these roads to have current setbacks.

Unless there are warning signs at customary entrances to every one of these roads no one will know that traps can be anywhere, even on the roads, until tragedy strikes. Wolf traps can kill dogs and severely injure children and adults. They are extremely difficult to open without hardware, extra strength and know-how.

Commissioner Burrows lists four exceptions because they are identified as high recreational use. However, keeping setbacks at 50 ft. for furbearer traps and snares and 150 ft for wolf traps and snares does not comply with the department's goal for public safety in high recreation use areas.

"A 500 foot setback for all ground sets including wolves was first adopted in 2013 for specifically identified public land roads and trails with high levels of recreational use." (FWP)

The regulations for Ravalli County's high recreation use areas should be brought up to FWP's standards with 500 ft. setbacks for all ground sets. People have a right to enjoy these areas without fear. They are our public lands, after all. The exceptions are:

- Forest Service Road #429 (Lost Horse Creek)
- Forest Service Road #468 (Nez Perce Pass Road)
- State Highway #38 (Skalkaho Pass)
- Forest Service Road #75 (Skalkaho/Rye)

Trappers have huge swaths of land including Kelly-humped roads to set their indiscriminate steel devices. Putting the public in danger on more roads on our public lands for a handful of trappers is wrong. It's privatizing public lands for 0.04% of Montanans. No other special interest gets away with terrifying and endangering people and closing public lands to other users.

I urge you to amend this amendment:

- 1. Keep the current setbacks on Ravalli County roads closed to motor vehicles and OHVs during trapping season.
- 2. Increase setbacks to 500 ft for ground sets on the four high recreation use areas designated as exceptions.

The proposed wolf trapping season dates from Dec. 2 to March 15 outside the geographic scope will not protect Grizzlies from being trapped and snared because they can be active from about March 1 through the end of December. I was seeing grizzlies by March 4.

Make it unlawful to trap wolves beyond January 1st - February 15th inside and outside of the geographic scope identified by federal court order.

The only mechanism to notify of trapped grizzlies is trappers reporting "to FWP within 24 hours", then 48 hours when FWP is aware of it. So now you're 3 days in from trapping an endangered species.

The proposal proceeds to horse trade with trappers and "encourage" trappers to "avoid setting traps" if grizzlies are in the area.

This is wholly ineffective. In any area grizzlies are observed or tracks identified":

- 1. Immediate close the areas
- 2. Make it unlawful to set traps
- 3. Add actionable and enforceable violations and penalties to deter this

We strongly oppose Commissioner Burrow's proposed amendment to remove setbacks in the specified areas of Region 2 because it does not protect against non-target captures.

We've already had more grizzlies killed by hunters than ever before.

I'm writing to support the proposal as worded.

As a trapper education instructor, we have always taught classes based on furbearer regulations. We never differentiated between the regulations that don't apply to predators and nongame. I feel a large portion of this proposal falls right in line with what many trappers teach and practice themselves.

I appreciate the fact that these newly proposed regulations will not go into effect unless a grizzly is caught in a foothold. I do not believe in regulation without causation. We've seen enough of that in recent years. I'd be dishonest if I said with an ever-expanding grizzly population that has well exceeded recovery goals the potential to catch one isn't increasing. The fact of the matter is the chances of a foothold catching and holding a grizzly still begin with .0%

Although I'm not keen on the trap jaw size restriction I understand the state's defensible stance on this. Trappers have accurately claimed for years that traps can most definitely be selective, and a trap with a jaw spread equal to or less than 5.5" would greatly reduce or possibly even eliminate the opportunity of an incidental catch of a grizzly. Due to a bear's biology, the placement of any trap would largely reduce the chances of it ever touching the trap pan, but that's a different topic for a different day.

We all know this proposal is a solution to a problem that doesn't truly exist. It's unfortunate the state is being held at the mercy of a federal judge who is sympathetic with litigant activist groups. I hope opportunities for commercial wildlife viewing operations will be restricted in the near future similarly to how the trapping community is. They are responsible for more "take" (by ESA definition) of grizzlies in a week than trappers have been in the past 4 decades.

Traps should be checked every 24 hours as extended trap time causes more tissue damage and exposes the animal to extreme temperatures.

Trapping setback should be maintained for public safety 150 ft/ 500 ft for wolf traps, off trails with clear signage present for public information. Failure to take these precautions is clear and present danger to recreating public and pets.

The over reach of the quota in 313 now to include an illegally taken animal recently found, should trigger the closure of both 313 and 316 as the total of 6 animals has been reached. Director and Commissioners,

Please stick with me. I know it is long, but it is important.

I have taught Hunter Education and Bowhunter Education for 30 years and while I realize that I will soon not be able to participate much longer, I am saddened that the department is not trying to save some of the ungulates so that our Youth may have a fraction of what I have enjoyed for so many years. Wolves have decimated the ungulate herds in Northwest Montana. The Department acknowledges that the area has too much cover to count how many elk, moose and deer are living there. But they make no allowance to the number of wolves hunters see that they use to base the wolf population. But, they will acknowledge that we have 500, or nearly half of the entire wolf population. Where I used to be able to bugle over a canyon where I would often get 2,3, or even more answers, now I can travel from ridge to ridge and never get an answer. And, if you do, they have learned that making noise attracts wolves and it is best to keep quiet.

One point of the proposed regulations that I think needs to be addressed is the trap size restriction if a Grizzly is caught early. Some of the best traps made today are 6 inch and are helpful in breaking through snow and frost. Many recreational trappers are using a 6" jaw spread for coyotes and it is wrong to make them pull their line in the unlikely event that a grizzly is caught. Catching one Grizzly would be extremely unlikely so the odds of a second one is even more unlikely and that is just not a good reason to penalize a large portion of the coyote trappers.

The Department is proposing an additional permit for non-game and predators. Is this to distinguish between recreational and professional trappers? Does it rally matter if who catches a wolf? This makes no sense because the department has a list of everyone who buys a trapping license and there is a survey to be filled out at the end of the season. This is just one more opportunity to create paperwork that has no value. We have a meeting in the spring that we have always shared any information that the Biologists have requested and we are proud of working with the Biologists to make sure the regulations work for everyone. What purpose does it serve to require a trapper to run down each landowner that has asked him to trap predators. I can see some landowners wondering if this is a liability release for the trapper or the Department. Is this another challenge or hurdle to persuade the tapper to guit. We are already required to report non target captures. Why is this being revisited? Adding challenges to the trapper is not going to make the people who do their research on the Disney channel not ask for the same things. Conceding anything just gives them more room to ask for something else. Their goal is to make trapping too much effort and get some to hang it up. Setbacks - Simplify the regulations with 50 foot setback on roads that are open for vehicular traffic. If the road is open, a 50 foot setback allows a person an opportunity to exercise their dog. Basing the setback on which animal is targeted is not being fair to the public because there will be traps 50 feet from the road. If the road is closed, there should be no setbacks. Why does it matter if the road was open 2 or 3 months ago? How is anyone supposed to know if it was or not? Not all gates have signage to let us know if it was supposed to be open. Does it matter if the dog is caught in a covote trap or a wolf trap? If someone is not familiar with how a trap works, they will possibly need help to release their dog, and this is not a life threatening experience. Tags are required on each trap and with a couple of phone calls can cure the problem. Despite the image some people paint, the traps do not rip off the legs of a dog and these are the same traps that were used to capture the wolves that were released here.

A few years ago, the Commission approved no setbacks, with a few exceptions, in Sanders County and has had no problems. Commissioner Burrow's amendment is a good step in the right direction. The department reviews the wolf regulations every year so there is no reason to not give it a try in more areas. Sanders County's success shows that the trappers are not setting traps where there are pedestrians walking their dogs and if they are, they are posting signage to alert everyone that there are traps in the area. It works, and we need to expand this to other areas. Mineral County is a prime example where this makes sense. The country is so steep that the wolves run the roads and cut across from one road to another. They can't smell any lure 150 feet from the road. If you cannot locate private property to trap on, you are wasting your time. My friends have trapped over 40 wolves in Mineral County and only 1 has come off Public land because of the restrictions in place. I am glad that Commissioner Burrows realizes that this will help the Department reach a livable population of wolves. The Department should be endorsing this idea. Who wrote the response to the Commissioner's amendment to oppose reducing setbacks? I am disappointed that the Department would ignore the requirement that the Legislature gave them to reduce the number of wolves.

Since we are restricted by a judge playing biologist, we should increase the hunting season. There is no reason to not have hunting open on private land for 365 days a year and only closed on public land for 6 weeks starting on the first of April to allow the pups to get large enough to leave the den. No one is going to mistake a Grizzly for a wolf when hunting. The legislature passed laws to reduce

the wolf population, and the Department is trying to say a 4 wolf reduction is meeting that requirement and it is not. It is past time to step up and start reducing the number of wolves. Wolves are tough to hunt or trap. If we are going to save our ungulate population, we need all the help we can get. Our Elk, Moose, and Deer are too important to ignore their plight. Thank you for the opportunity to comment. I hope you can see your way to help save some of the ungulates for our Future Generations.

Thank you for your continued efforts directed at obtaining management authority of the growing Grizzly Bear population in MT. Although we at the Foundation for Wildlife Management understand the intent of these efforts, we cannot support all aspects of your proposal for the following reasons.

• The authority to regulate coyote trapping does not fall within FWP jurisdiction.

• Requiring supplemental licenses for already licensed trappers is a burden trappers should not face. (If annual mandatory reporting of trapper efforts is needed for FWP to record targeted trap nights per species, perhaps that would provide the much needed data to properly defend trapping as the targeted management tool it is?)

Commissioner Burrows Amendment:

We at F4WM support the amendment as proposed, and appreciate Commissioner Burrows research, and his effort to maximize trapper opportunity, while continuing the effort to minimize land user conflicts by excluding the roadways being utilized by other land user groups during that time frame.

Opposition to this amendment will never be content, as their goal includes ending trapping all-together. Trappers are unjustly viewed as the "Cause" of land user conflicts any time they arise, but the truth is, trappers have just as much right to utilize our public lands as any other user group, those other groups should be making concessions to avoid these conflicts just as commonly as trappers are forced to make concessions to avoid conflict.

Following Legislative Direction:

Given that:

- FWP was directed legislatively to reduce wolf numbers
- MT wolf populations have not fluctuated much more than sixty wolves up or down in the past ten years
- Wolf trapping efforts have been hamstrung by Federal Court order
- What is FWP doing to reduce wolf numbers? We at the Foundation for Wildlife Management would propose the following:
- A Statewide wolf harvest quota that replaces all unit or regional quotas
- Year-round hunting seasons that only close when the established quota is met
- The use of thermal imaging for wolf hunting be allowed in all units

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) proposal for the Fall 2024-Winter 2025 wolf trapping regulations. Defenders of Wildlife (Defenders) is a national non-profit conservation organization with 9,300 members and supporters in Montana and more than 2.1 million nationwide. Over the last three decades, Defenders has played an important role in the restoration of wolves in the Northern Rockies. This work included our long-running livestock loss compensation program and our ongoing conflict reduction program. We transitioned our compensation program and a \$100,000 start-up fund to the Montana Livestock Loss Board in 2008 and continue to assist livestock producers in Montana and across the West with conflict reduction tools and techniques to minimize losses to wolves and other predators. We operate these projects in partnership with county, state, tribal and federal agencies.

We strongly oppose continuing to allow snaring of wolves in Montana as it will certainly result in injury and death to other wildlife species, including listed species such as grizzly bears and lynx. While the trapping method restrictions imposed by the recent court order could mitigate some impacts to grizzly bears, we recommend that these restrictions be applied statewide to accommodate continued range expansion of this species. Trapping end dates should also be flexible to allow for early emergence of grizzly bears from denning sites. Snares present a real and significant danger to the health and safety of all animals on public lands and the risk posed by this method of trapping is simply unacceptable.

We ask the Commission to reject the use of these methods of take across Montana as they have no ethical or science-based justification. Additionally, we request that the Commission reject Commissioner Burrow's amendment because it expands use of these methods through wide-scale reduction in trapping setbacks in region 2.

Hello Commissioners,

I have a concern regarding two things-

The 48 hour time period in the category "48 hours after FWP is aware of and has publicly noticed the capture of any grizzly bear" 48 hours is a very long time for FWP to wait before addressing the damage and critical condition of a trapped bear. These bears are an endangered species and as such your FWP has an obligation to contact USFWS immediately.

Please change to "as soon as FWP is aware and has publicly noticed the capture of any Grizzly Bear."

The next concern I have is under the same section-"48 hours after FWP is aware of capture of any Grizzly"-

A breakaway lock device installed on the loop end designed to release when more than 350 pounds of force is applied;

How can this be safe if an orphaned almost 2 year old cub has lost their mother and is travelling solo, if they become trapped by a snare this snare will not release because a 1 year and a 1/2 Grizzly cub won't be capable of applying 350 lbs of force and would not survive being caught in a device such a snare.

My example to drive home my point is that in Wyoming Grizzly 399s 1 year 8 month year old cub is an orphan now. If she were to be snared she would need help to be released immediately.

As Grizzly Bears travel farther to find berries (Jackson Hole had no berries this fall), more orphans will be the norm because there still are not enough flashing signs alerting drivers that Grizzly moms w cubs are on the road. More incidents w traps and snares will happen.

The Montana Stockgrowers Association (MSGA) appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Fall 2024-Winter 2025 Wolf and Other Species Trapping Regulations. MSGA represents ranchers in all regions of the state who have a long-standing history with utilizing trapping and snaring as a management tool to protect livestock from coyote depredation.

MSGA also has long been an advocate for state managed grizzly bears and the delisting of the species. We have supported the actions Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) has taken toward this goal. MSGA continues to advocate for genetic connectivity between the Northern Continental Divide Ecosystem (NCDE) and the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem (GYE), as well as support producer programs like the carcass pickup program and the use of preventative, non-lethal management tools. Most recently, MSGA has even taken a step further, and intervened on behalf of FWP in the Flathead Lolo Bitterroot Citizen Task Force v. the State of Montana lawsuit, defending the department's actions regarding predator trapping.

MSGA appreciates FWP's attempt to identify and provide solutions for potential vulnerabilities that may impact the decision to delist the grizzly bear by the United States Fish Wildlife Service (USFWS). However after reviewing the proposed regulation, MSGA needs to highlight two areas of concern.

Affidavit Requirements

The proposal requires trappers who are trapping for livestock protection purposes to sign an affidavit that includes the landowner's name and county. MSGA understands the legal protection in place and we further understand the protection of information afforded by FWP's assurances of privacy, however we want to eliminate any use of producer information and disagree with the premise that this information is necessary at all to successfully implement this regulation. Additionally, we recognize the proposed declaration includes an acknowledgement of landowner permission, but have concerns a landowner's name could be written without their knowledge and would not know until an enforcement action was taken. We believe the same result can be achieved by the department assuming trapping and snaring is being done for livestock depredation and those who are choosing to trap for recreational purposes can self-identify whether through an affidavit or other process. This is only further highlighted with the fact that the additional trapping and snaring requirement of 48 hours after a grizzly bear is caught in a trap is only for recreational trapping. MSGA would request that there be a shift for the affidavit requirement from livestock protection to recreation.

Preferred Regulation Sunset if Delisting Petition is Unsuccessful

As the regulations currently read, the regulation will have to be reviewed by the commission each August. It is expected that we will see a grizzly bear delisting decision from USFWS in early 2025. MSGA asks that the regulations include a sunset clause if we do not see a delisted status next year. If the decision is made to keep grizzly bears on the Endangered Species list, then it becomes clear that regulations on coyote trapping are irrelevant to a listing decision and therefore do not need to remain in place. MSGA seeks to ensure that the rules will not be brought forward for Commission approval in August of 2025 if grizzly bears maintain their protected status.
